### With My Hand on the Plow:

I love being part of a busy growing church. I love being caught up in the numerous deadlines that represent our common life together. Yes, it frequently stresses me out...but when I am really honest with myself, I have to admit that it is way better than being part of a church that just sits there. There is no part of me that likes to "just sit there."

Last Sunday, my first Sunday after the Red Shirt Project, we baptized two new Christians in a wonderful service at our 10:30 worship time.

This summer, we have lived into our Vestry's decision to move our primary worship time to 1030, so as to accommodate our Christian Formation and Education hour being at 0915 on Sunday mornings. I am very pleased with the response of our church to engaging life-long formation. Attendance at our forums has been really strong, and I am very excited now about our expansion to a broader array of offerings when we kick it all into high gear on September 13<sup>th</sup>, with our beginning of our Fall Programming. Sunday school, Journey to Adulthood programs, Godly Play, and three simultaneous adult Christian formation classes will all be offered in our 0915 to 1015 time slot. I am hoping that the inclusion of all of our family members in wor-


ship will be an enriching and growing experience for our church community. I am also hoping that our core of acolytes will grow, so that our younger church members can begin to be more engaged in the service of others through assisting at the altar for our celebration of the Lord's Supper on Sunday mornings.

This summer, to better include more members into our pool of those who feel called to read from Holy Scripture at our services,

Mary Newcomb has somehow managed to rework the schedule of lectors so that three readers are now exercising their ministry at each service, thus increasing by a

third the amount of persons assisting in our worship services. So many of you wanted to be part of our worship experience by offering your gifts to the Lord, and I am very grateful for Mary's work at scheduling all of this. I know there is no way I could ever make sense of the demands of scheduling this!

I would also like to ask you to seriously consider joining in our choir. This past Sunday, Robin and Glen held a class that about 24 of us attended that was just sort of a sing-along of hymns and service music, along with a "Christmas in July" sing that Robin arranged for us. It was great fun and very informative. It got me to



thinking that maybe if we arranged a forum that was a little longer, say four weeks in October, then more of us would see singing in the choir to be something that was possible for us to do, rather than see singing in the choir as something we somehow weren't "good enough" for. I hope you will consider this and pray about it. The commitment is to one rehearsal on Thursday evenings for ninety minutes, and to sing, joyfully, on Sunday mornings. I would love it if our choir had about ten more voices in it...and our worship experience would be greatly enhanced with more voices leading us in song. Please pray about this, and talk to Glen Newcomb if this might be something you would consider.

Also this fall, on the third Friday of each month...mark your calendars now...it is Movie Night at St. Mary's. This four month event, (and more if you all love it!) will be classic black and white films that are favorites of mine. The first film will be *The Grapes of Wrath* on the 18<sup>th</sup> of September from 1900 to 2200 in the evening. We will make a fresh pot of coffee and you will need to bring popcorn to share, and anything else that means movie going to you. All films will be in Fitch Hall, with enough time to talk about the movie after it is over. October will be *To Kill a Mockingbird*, November will be *Casablanca* and December will be the original *Miracle on 34<sup>th</sup> Street*.

We will also be observing St. Francis Day this year on October 4<sup>th</sup>, so get your doggies and kitties ready for the big day (and birds, hermit crabs, birds and all manner of animal friends suitable for the day). October will also feature our All Hallows Eve Day of the Dead service on October 31<sup>st</sup> where we will remember our loved ones who have gone before us with a special service that begins at 4 in the afternoon. The next day, All Saints Day, will feature baptisms and a big festival service in

honor of All the Saints. November will again be our month to focus on stewardship with our festival service of New Consecration Sunday on the 22<sup>nd</sup> with Bishop Gethin Hughes as our featured speaker and leader for NCS day.

We are a busy and vibrant church. We are also a community that gives for the growth of the Kingdom of God in our time. With everything going on this fall, we will continue to be the beacon of light on the hill for the Lompoc Valley. Our support for our various outreach ministries will not waiver or stop in all we are doing to care for our community and for others. This is an exciting time to be at St. Mary's...and I am so happy to be your Rector and to be so immersed in the ministry of Jesus Christ in this place. With our exciting history and commitment to the ministry of all the baptized, we will go forward together, Adiante! into God's future. I often think of the old advertising slogan for the Motel 6 chain..."we'll leave the light on for you". It seems to me that is us...St. Mary's...the light is always on for you".

## Thanks from the Outreach Committee

Thanks to the overwhelming response from all of you here at St. Mary's, the Outreach Committee was able to purchase and fill 76 backpacks for the homeless and underprivileged children in our community. This is an annual back to school project. This year 35 backpacks were given to children in the primary grades (K-3) and 61 to 4th grade through high school students.. The school supplies were delivered to the Catholic Charities, the Homeless Education Liaison program (HELP) , a county program that provides a tutor for the school aged children of homeless families, and to MISC. an agency that helps needy families who deal with mental health issues. All the school supplies that remained after the backpacks were filled .were given to Patty Balcena, who teaches kindergarten at LaHonda elementary, to be dispersed as needed by the teachers on that campus. ## Christian Formation News: Team Members Needed

Our Sunday Morning Formation Hour has gotten off to a good start with some very useful and informative offerings from the Stephens Ministry. Our full range of Sunday Morning Learning Circles will begin on September 13. We have a few gaps to fill.

I would like to have two teams of two [storyteller and door person] for our Godly Play class. Michelle Pittenger will be continuing as one of our storytellers. The class will have children from preschool through third grade. This is a very specific Montessori based method of Christian formation which requires special training, which we will provide. If we have two teams, the commitment would be for two Sundays a month. This method requires a calm,

low keyed person who would not be overly directive with the children, but would allow them the time and space for their own spiritual responses and reflections. If you know of someone who fits this description or if you hear the Holy Spirit whispering in your ear please come and speak to me.

We would also like to complete the furnishing and equipping of our Godly Play space. This represents a significant, but one time only expense. We will have various story sets pictured on our bulletin board for "adoption". This could be a lovely and unique way to honor a child or grandchild or any relative or friend on a special occasion such as a birthday or baptism etc. We will arrange to have plaques put on each set with the donor or honoree's name.

Six parishioners will begin their first year of Education For Ministry on Wednesdays from 6:00 to 8:30 P.M. beginning September 16. The first year focuses on the Old Testament, spiritual auto biographies, and theological reflection.

## **2009 General Convention**

I just got back from two weeks in Anaheim running the Discovery Center in the Exhibit Hall of General Convention. It was quite an experience. General Convention takes place every three years and is like a huge gathering of the clan. I saw people I knew from all over the country and from years back, like a family reunion minus the guilt. The scope of the Episcopal Church and its concerns is impressive. There were delegates and representatives from all around the world. The exhibit hall was like a global bazaar with booths selling handmade items from many countries. Other exhibits represented various causes and interest groups as well as publishers, schools, seminaries, missions and outreach projects. Much debate, discourse and decisions take place including passing budgets and resolutions. Resolutions shape the direction of the church. The one that meant the most to me and my work is the Charter for Lifelong Christian Formation. This guides and informs my mission at St. Mary's. I hope you will read it and be inspired by it as a call to action for all of us.

## The Revival of the St. Mary's WISH LIST


Welcome back to our Wish List. Here are a few new items for you to consider:

I don't know if I could have endured the glances and gossip.** I would have been terrified by what Joseph might think, or do. Faith costs. Trust costs.

I struggle with faith. I get impatient and frustrated. I imagine the worst and it frequently happens. In my really bad moments, I want as much reassurance as I can get. God is amazingly patient with me, more than I am with myself. All my attempts to evade His love are futile. I **don't even know why I run, except that I lack God's perspective. I can't see God's love being perfected in me.** Instead, I see the same old failings and wonder what God can possibly find to love.

Mary was fortunate; she **didn't have to wait long** to see things start to happen. Pregnancy works that way. It quickly becomes clear to a woman that she is in the grips of

something much bigger and more powerful than her individual needs and desires. Love motivates **and drives her. There is no saying "no" to Life. Mary expected and believed in the best. She was so in love with god that she put herself completely in His hands without reservations. What God has begun, God will complete.**
