With My Hand on the Plow: Autumn Leaves

I have only lived one place where I recall the Autumn Leaves changing...and that was when Deborah and I lived in New York City from 1988-1991. At the General Theological Seminary in the Chelsea neighborhood of Manhattan, there were large wonderful trees on the grounds of the Seminary that would change about this time of year, and glorious colors, orange, gold, and yellows would emerge and cover the sidewalks on the Close. I remember it so well, because Simon was little and had a race car that he loved to ride, and especially I remember him riding amongst the leaves of Autumn. We

seemed to need to get a lot of riding in then, because we knew winter and the snow was coming. Otherwise, it has been all Texas and California...and rarely have I had winter, spring, summer and fall in my life.

But in the church, there is a rhythm of life that is seasonal, and I live in those seasons. Autumn, and the changing of the leaves, means a coming to the end of the long Pentecost season...a change in liturgical colors is coming... from green to the Marian blue of Advent...then to the white of Christmas and Epiphany. Change is the constant in our lives...both at home and here at church.


This fall, in the month of October, you will experience a change in our liturgy at church that I am very excited about. On the second Sunday

of the month I will spend the first part of the service at the 10 o'clock worship gathered with our children in Fitch Hall. We will have the opportunity to talk about what they are learning and doing in Sunday School, and have time to pray together in a way that I believe will be really good for me, and hopefully, for them as well. I got to know many of our kids this summer during Vacation Bible School, and now that there are so many new youngsters who have joined our church and our Sunday School, I look forward to getting to know them and to being their priest as well. I have asked Howard Gould

to lead the first part of the worship service in my place. I will come in at the Gospel, preach, and continue as the Celebrant.

Then, on the last Sunday of October, (and the last Sunday of

every month) we will have a service at ten o'clock that will be all about our kids. They will be the lectors, the ushers, the acolytes, the greeters, they will assist me at the altar, everything that is possible for one of our youngsters or young adults to do, they will do. This first Sunday is also Halloween so I suspect that your ushers may also look like witches and wizards and who knows what else that day! There will be a sermon offered that day, I suspect by me at first, but I hope to get some of our Young Adults to join in the offering as well as time goes on.



I believe that being part of a community that values children as our Lord did, "bring the little children to me" is what Jesus would have us do. I believe our children can teach us many things about our faith that we need to learn. I look forward to the opportunity to provide space and time for that to happen.

I am excited about our new Director of Music, Chris Bowman. Part of what Chris wants to do is to bring our kids together to sing during Advent and Christmas. I love this idea and hope that you will be supportive of it and encourage you kids to participate. Hopefully, we can schedule rehearsal time for the Christmas Eve pageant and singing together so that both can be accomplished at the same time. As you know, in order for our children to participate, they need your commitment as parents and parishioners to get to rehearsals.

Also this fall, we will begin the third year of our Stewardship program, New Consecration Sunday. During the month of November, there will be a focus on the teachings and offerings of this important part of our life as a parish community. New Consecration Sunday will be November 21, with one big service at 10 am, followed by a lunch in Fitch Hall. Please mark your calendars now.

There are so many other things going on in our busy parish life that I want to remind you that going to www.stmaryslompoc.org is the best way to get current weekly information...as the weekly events calendar is updated regularly for the week coming. Also, check your email! Our communications Ministry Development Team is really working hard with email blasts to get information out as quickly as we can...mostly as reminders of events in our parish life.

Finally, Autumn Leaves is a poignant reminder that we live in a cycle of life...we know all too well that the deaths of Lee Hill and Jesus Gasca, Lee at 78 and Jesus at 61, that our time in this

life is precious. It has been a hard week for us and for our parish family. Take comfort in knowing that the message of the Bible does not change: "For God so loved the world that He gave his only Son that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life."

Prayer Shawls

Would you like a Prayer Shawl? What is a Prayer Shawl? Who makes a Prayer Shawl?

A Prayer Shawl is a knit or crochet shawl, lap robe or baby blanket made by St. Mary's Parish members. The shawl is blessed during worship and delivered by a contact person to someone who is in need of a tangible reminder of God's encircling Love, whether ill, in sorrow...or Celebrating!

The maker uses new, donated yarn, praying intentionally with every stitch. A prayer tag is tied to the wrap with an additional prayer. Is there a charge? No!

To request a Prayer Shawl, you may use the request forms in the Narthex by the Prayer Request Box, or ask Mary Newcomb (733-3811), Bits Bowles, Cynthia LeRoy, Pat Middleton, or Charlotte Compton, or leave a contact number with the church office (733-4400).

Who can make a Prayer Shawl? You can; if you knit or crochet, pick up yarn from the choir room and begin! Any design is fine, and finished pieces are usually 60" by 30". I am happy to teach a very simple pattern to anyone with a crochet hook!


